## **Summer Color**

~~Priscilla Patterson, Head Gardener For the past several years, one of our goals has been to increase the amount of colorful flowering annuals that brighten up the summer garden. Historically, the spectacular spring display of blooming shrubs and trees was justifiably considered by many to be the highlight of Connie's garden, dramatically punctuated by later season displays such as the huge multi-colored blossoms of the Japanese Iris, the towering whorls of Candelabra primroses and the textural tapestry of the Heather bed.

Perennials provided most of the ongoing seasonal bloom and interest for the remainder of the year until autumn, with a few annual color spots tucked in here and there to liven things up a bit. By and large, the garden remained an increasingly shaded oasis of green in a rural urban landscape. That oasis has been the attraction for many, a place of calm and tranquility year-round.

However, the maturing shrubs and trees have been shading out less vigorous plants, causing the loss of layers of interest and definition, so we began to open up the garden and let the sunshine in.

The ultimate goal is to create areas of full sun where we could expand the plant palette to include sun loving annuals and plants with low water requirements.



The recently reconfigured parking lot has been a hugely successful experiment in fulfilling those goals. Almost all of the annuals that visitors can find there have been grown from seed by a couple of dedicated volunteers. The bright, bold colors provide a warm welcome to all entering the parking lot and are frequently conversation openers if volunteers are present.

The driveway divider strip proved to be the ideal location for one of our favorite annuals, the Gazania, a flamboyant, low growing member of the daisy family or Asteraceae. It's hot summer colors in striped or blotched shades of orange, yellow, cream, pink and red set the color palette for the remainder of the bed. A South African native, Gazanias require full sun, warmth, excellent drainage and prefer a sandy soil. They will flourish throughout the summer under these conditions with very little attention and are often used in xeric plantings such as rock gardens although treating them to a little water occasionally will produce bigger blooms. They do well not only in rock gardens and parking lots but also close to the ocean, being impervious to salt spray.

Planted in the same strip you can also see the perfect companion plant to Gazania, echoing the same color tones and sharing the same native origin. Calendula is a taller plant with fluffier heads of daisy-like petals in solid colors with a brown center. These plants grow very easily from seed and in our zone 8 climate, will reliably self-sow and return the following spring. For an earlier display, it is best to use fresh seed started in pots and planted out just after the last frost. Once established, calendula have low water requirements, need a well drained soil, and will continue to bloom and grow throughout the summer if deadheaded. Pinching back will produce a bushier, more attractive plant. The flowers have traditionally been used in culinary infusions as herbal teas or medicinally as salves for skin infections and wound healing and are believed to have anti-inflammatory properties.

Both of these plants are worthy, attractive additions to the summer garden that are very easy to grow and maintain. Consider investing in a packet of seeds for your own garden next year or look for starts at your favorite nursery!
